Members Exhibition

29 September to 23 October Delivery of exhibits 22 to 25 September

Have you been thinking about your Members' Exhibition entries yet?
Sponsors and awards are being confirmed and the entry form will be put on the website and emailed to members as soon as possible. In the meantime, if you haven't already started on your entries, now's the time to do it.

Keeping with the format of previous exhibitions, there will be awards for both hand-built and wheel-thrown work. Exhibits incorporating both hand-building and wheel-throwing techniques will be considered for these awards but for the hand-building award the majority of a work must be hand-built and for the wheel-throwing award, the majority of a work must be wheel-thrown.

A few other points to keep in mind:

• All exhibitors must be current members of the society at the time of

the exhibition and delivery of work.

- All entries must be the original work of the exhibitor and have been completed in the 12 months preceding the exhibition.
- Up to three entries may be submitted, only one of which may be a group or set.
- Proposals for installation-type entries must be submitted to the office at least two weeks prior to delivery of entries and will be considered at the discretion of the exhibition co-ordinators.
- The exhibition is a ceramics exhibition and any non-ceramic materials in an exhibit should form a minor part. Entries that do not meet this criterion may be excluded.
- Entry fees are non-refundable regardless of whether or not an exhibit is selected for display.
- All entries except those entered in the Tertiary category must be for sale. Would you like to help with the exhibition? Assistance is needed with

installation and the opening night (preparing and serving food, serving drinks, etc). If you'd like to get involved email the office

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The Doug Alexander Award

A brief history

1998

The small band of enthusiasts who started Canberra Potters' Society in 1975 were encouraged by Doug Alexander. His work and approach to pottery was widely admired. He delivered workshops and was always available to members. His enthusiasm and support in those early days greatly contributed to the Society becoming the strong and vibrant organisation that it is today. Doug died suddenly in 1981, in his mid thirties. Initially the Society sponsored an annual lecture in his honour. Later it was decided to make a substantial award available to support the work of local potters. The Doug Alexander

Memorial Award, today valued at \$1000, is the major award at the Society's annual exhibition and is provided to encourage work in the local area and to acknowledge the valuable contribution made by Doug Alexander to pottery.

Winter School FEAST! 2016 Winter School and Friday Night Supper Club by Fran Romano, Education Program Manager

This year's Winter School with Steve Williams was a resounding success with 11 participants drawn from far and wide. Participants were contacted prior to the workshop and given the design brief from Steve. They were asked to decide on a dish to be shared at the popular Friday night Supper Club which was to be the culmination point for the week

The key ingredient of this dish was to be the inspiration for the development of a series of tableware. The (ambitious) aim was to have these small works fired in the soda kiln during the week for use at the Supper Club on Friday evening! This schedule meant that the group had to hit the ground running on Monday! Moulds were taken of the vegetable/fruit brought by each person. Participants worked quickly to make prototypes using parts of the mould. With no time to over think things meant the creative juices were flowing. Everyone worked really hard too as works had to be dried on Wednesday and fired on Thursday. Whilst this approach can be challenging and requires a great deal of trust from the participants it is a great way for people to learn by extending themselves. The results on the table on Friday evening reflected this.

The popular Friday night Supper Club was the culmination of the week. Although the evening was particularly cold and bleak, numbers and interest were good.

Steve Williams, our guest presenter, used the Supper Club to showcase the work of the Winter School participants. We saw how the workshop participants had been able to take the essence of the key ingredient of their dish as the starting point for the design of their tableware.

All present agreed that the table looked wonderful and once the foods were

plated up onto the vessels it all came together and made sense!

Steve spoke more generally about his own work too and the development of his ideas over his years of teaching in the TAFE sector and beyond. It was a great and inspiring evening. A wonderful conclusion to the week which had been challenging and dynamic for all participants.

EASS 2016 Exhibition

Watson Arts Centre Gallery July 28–August 21 Gallery open Thur-Sun 10am-4pm

EASS 2016 features the work of five emerging ceramic artists, all recent graduates of the ANU School of Art: Sue Hewat, Mahala Hill, Alya Khan, Anna-Maree O'Neill and Eden Reni.

Sue Hewat's Honours research was an investigation into how she could use ceramic materials and techniques to represent the hybrid nature of the intertidal zone of the Australian beach. Monoprinting, a traditional print method translated into a ceramic genre, has become her primary vehicle to merge and transform surfaces. By blending her intuitive painterly prints within a range of ceramic vessels and forms, she has been able to represent the essence of the ebb and flow of the tide.



Mahala Hill is also drawn to the sea but for her it's because of the astonishing inhabitants, vast depths and the visually captivating colours and textures. In this new series of works she uses sculptural vessel forms to reference the liminal state between life and death, destruction and beauty. These forms directly refer to the

environmental issue of bleached coral and the consequences that humans have on these living reefs and pose a single question: are we taking more away than we can give back?

Whilst captivated by the aesthetics of historical buildings, Alya Khan is also intrigued by the design and structure of modern and contemporary edifices. Her ceramic sculptures are an abstract representation of buildings she has observed around Canberra, capturing the external skeletal lines whilst leaving the internal space hollow. These voids become a resting point to reflect on

what is contained within building structures.

Anna-Maree O'Neill is a ceramic sculptor whose focus lies in the creation of anthropomorphic creatures that blur the boundaries of human, animal and machine. Her contemporary sculptures embody human characteristic, each with their own personality. They are cartoon like, comical and playful. In this body of work she has created a world for her rabbit creatures to live in that reflects the ultimate Australian fantasy – sea, surf and sun. This holiday playground is where her whimsical wildlife comes to play.

The work of Eden Reni plays with the merging of biological and mechanical forms, showing a relationship between the two elements while still maintaining independence. The glaze designs on his works mirror the forms of the ceramic pieces, exploring ideas of the micro and the macro and inquiring into the universal and repetitive nature of form.

Shapeshifters: 3D Printing the future **Sturt Gallery** until 18 September

In collaboration with Western Plains Cultural Centre, the Australian Design Centre has produced Shapeshifters: 3D Printing the Future as a playful exploration of 3D printing. It's all about imagination, innovation and new methods of making, drawing on the high-tech and rapidly evolving world of 3D printers and fluid extrusion methodology. 3D printing is also built on sharing. Open source software and shared maker spaces mean anyone can try their hand at creating. During the industrial revolution, the machine was used to standardise everything. Now mass production is replaced by mass customization.

The designers and makers included in Shapeshifters all begin with a real world idea. That idea is translated into a digital something – a piece of code, a CAD model or perhaps a verse of music - before being transformed into the final physical form. By experimenting with digital fabrication technologies, the designers build on their traditional modes of making to create something entirely new.

Commissioned specifically for the NGA, Mud men is an installation of monumental ceramic sculptures by exciting new talent Ramesh

Nithiyendran. Ostentatious in style, the work draws on a wildly diverse range of subjects from phallus worship and military monuments to grunge and self-parody. Nithiyendran presents a provocative response to the NGA's unique architecture and collections.
